CHILLIDA LEKU AND DONOSTI

The sculptor maintained the traditional identity of the country house in the restoration works. Outside, the country house retains its traditional appearance. Chillida approached the building restoration as though it were a sculpture. It was a long process, governed by freedom of action and by a double purpose: to introduce space inside the

building and to preserve its identity.



After the tour we went to Donosti and we went to the beach to take photos and to enjoy the views. Near the beach we saw the "Peine del Viento", which was was in the museum. This work is one of the most important and well-known work. The three steel sculptires are embedded in the rocks above the water at the western end of "La Concha Bay".

In adittion, "La Concha Bay" is frequently cited as one of the most beautiful and the

most famous urban beaches in Europe. It is a sandy beach and shallow substrate.



After being on the beach, we walked around the city watching buildings and shopping typical things from Donosti. The time went very fast and we walked to the bus to go home. On the way to the bus we saw a rainbow, something postive to finish the day.
